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2007 SURVEY OF DEKALB PARK DISTRICT RESIDENTS

I. Introduction

The DeKalb Park District (DPD) is virtually conterminous with the City of DeKalb, Illinois, which until recent years had been a rural area, but now rapidly transforming into a community of 50,000 by 2010. With a 25 percent growth rate in the past decade, the City now describes itself as “an urban community in a rural setting.” What are the implications of such a multi-faceted and dynamic community on its public park facilities and recreational needs of residents? In order to guide strategic planning, the Public Opinion Laboratory of Northern Illinois University was commissioned by DPD to conduct and report on a telephone survey of its residents.

The specific population of interest was defined as noninstitutionalized, English-speaking adult residents (age 18 and over) living in a household with a “landline” telephone within DeKalb’s municipal limits. Not included in this defined population were on-campus residential students attending NIU. A special census taken in 2004 estimated the number of households in the City of DeKalb to be 14,324. In order to provide at least 95% confidence that actual District population status will be estimated within five percent of survey results, a sample of 400 respondents was targeted. This is the level of precision used for most community surveys. Random digit dial (RDD) methodology, enhanced with listed numbers, was employed within District geography, insuring that every household with a landline telephone had a non-zero probability of being called. Household telephone numbers were drawn and dialed randomly from this sample frame during a four-week period from February 9 through March 7, 2007.

In all, 4,439 calls were made to 1,351 telephone numbers, and 405 interviews were completed. Eliminating non-working numbers, non-residences, numbers with no eligible respondents available, and those out of geography, the response rate was 37.1 percent. Median completed interview length was 16 minutes. A script of the survey instrument is shown in Exhibit A.

II. Executive Summary

A community telephone survey of 405 adult residents of the DeKalb Park District (DPD) was conducted in the winter of 2007. Objectives were to determine frequency of using DPD facilities, program participation, reasons for not using DPD facilities or participating in programs, opinions about potential improvements and funding, and overall satisfaction with DPD services. A response rate of 37.1 percent was attained, and among households where a person was contacted, the cooperation rate was 77.4 percent.

Hopkins Park was found to be the most heavily used single facility, with over 40 percent of respondents reporting frequent or occasional use this past year. Collectively, the many neighborhood parks maintained by DPD were about as frequently visited, although half of these park users could not name their neighborhood park. Lack of time was the primary reason offered for not using park district facilities. About one in four DeKalb families participated in at least one park district program this past year. Lack of time again was cited most often for precluding participation, but also, many respondents reported being unaware that various DPD facilities and programs existed. Many seniors felt there were few age-appropriate activities for them.

Where do DeKalb residents go most frequently for recreation? Most often, residents simply engage in their own independent pursuit of fitness and recreation. Among those who do seek out more organized venues, the most frequent sources were found to be school programs and athletics, as well as DPD offerings. Expanding program offerings was found to be the most likely way of increasing DPD use.

Concerning park district improvements over the next five to ten years, respondents gave highest priority to expanding paved pedestrian and bicycle trails. Finally, a solid majority of 66 percent believed voters should support a referendum to increase park tax revenues. A listing of verbatim responses to open-ended commentary is found in Appendix C.

III. Detailed Findings

Demographics

The unit of analysis for this survey was the household. One adult household representative responded for the entire household. The gender split of respondents slightly favored women (56 to 44%). However, younger families were harder to reach, and conversely, seniors were oversampled. For purposes of estimating *overall* District status from sample results, a statistical weighting adjustment was made to control for disproportionate sampling. Comparison of the three groups is shown in Exhibit 1. Alternatively, it is often most informative to look at results *within*

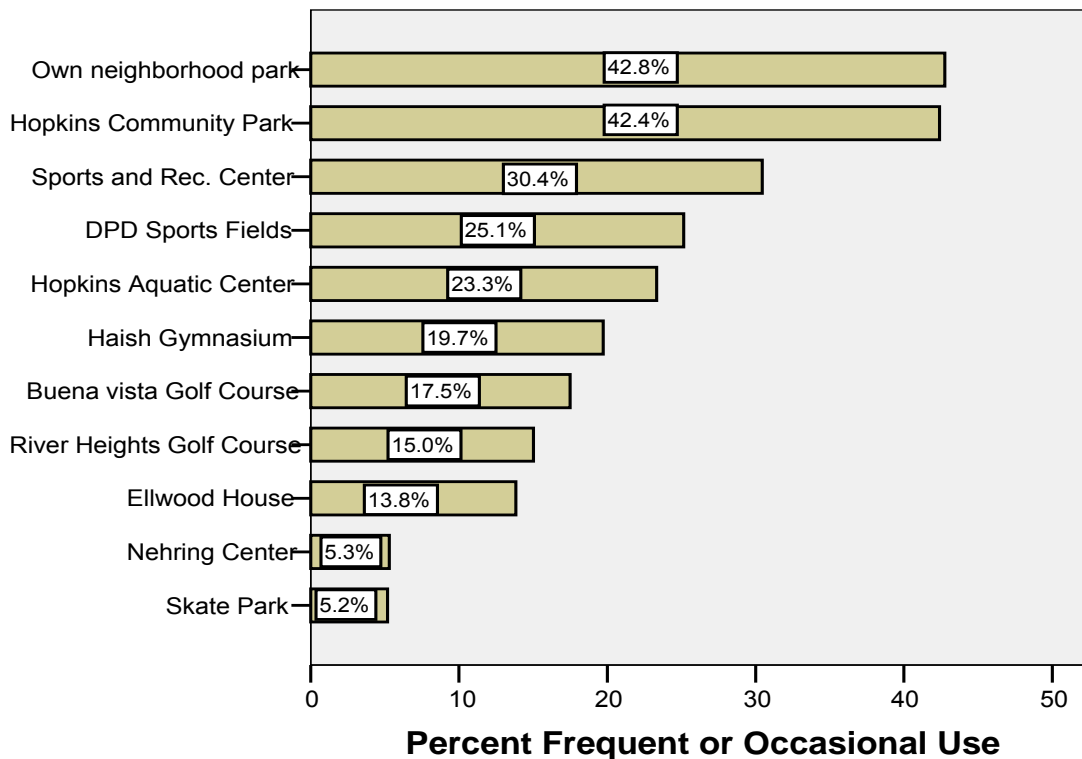
each of the age ranges, since park district usage patterns would be expected to vary considerably among young adults, families with school children, and senior citizens. For this purpose, unweighted subgroup results are presented in Appendix B along with overall frequency tabulations for every coded survey item.

Not including the NIU campus student resident community, DeKalb is comprised of a large segment of long-term residents (41% are residents over 20 years) and an influx of new households (26%) within the past five years. About 56 percent of the weighted sample (i.e., best population estimate) live in a household without children under 18. Only 13 percent do not have access to a computer with internet connectivity. While ninety percent report being registered to vote in DeKalb, the figure drops to 71 percent among the under 35 age group.

Use of Facilities

The first main area of inquiry concerned how frequently District households utilized various facilities operated by the DPD in 2006. Comparative results for the weighted sample are shown in Exhibit 2. Among those who visited their neighborhood park in

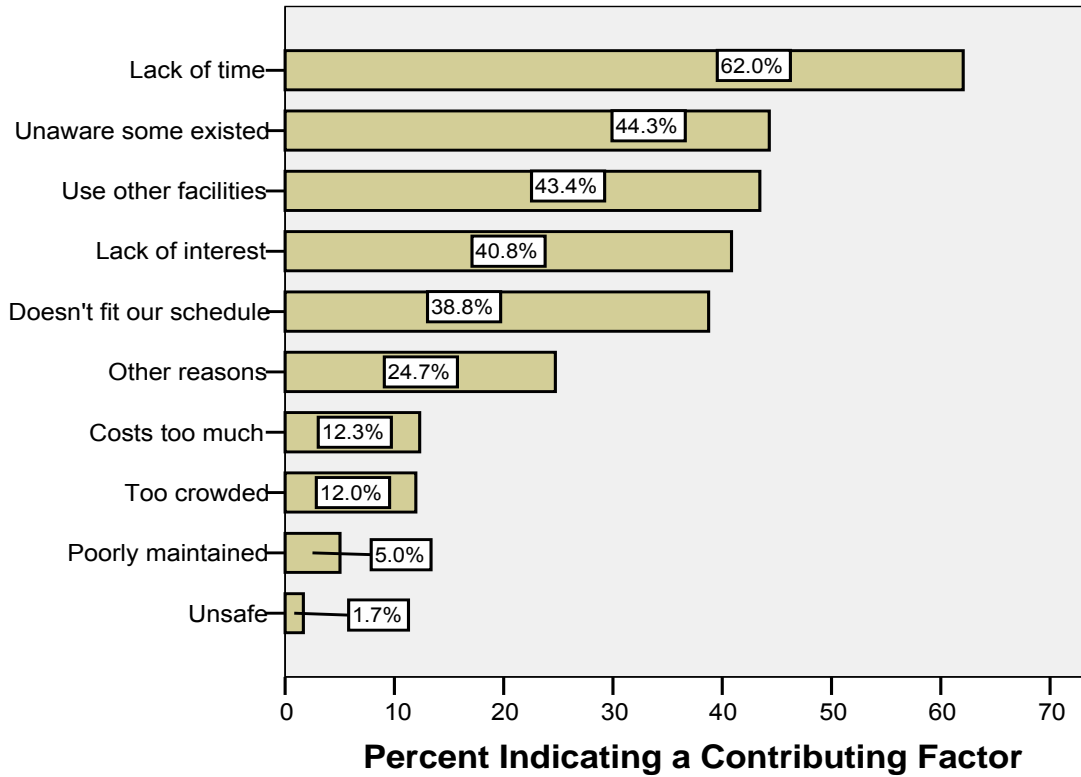
EXHIBIT 2

2006, only 45.4 percent could remember its name. Lions Park accounted for 20.2 percent of all neighborhood parks mentioned. Respondents were asked to indicate what factors may have contributed to why their household did not make greater use of park facilities than they did this past year. Reasons most commonly indicated are shown in Exhibit 3. Lack of time was mentioned by a majority of respondents.

Worthy of note is the relatively high percentage who indicated a lack of awareness that some facilities existed. Over 40 percent cited use of other facilities either in

Reasons For Not Using Facilities More



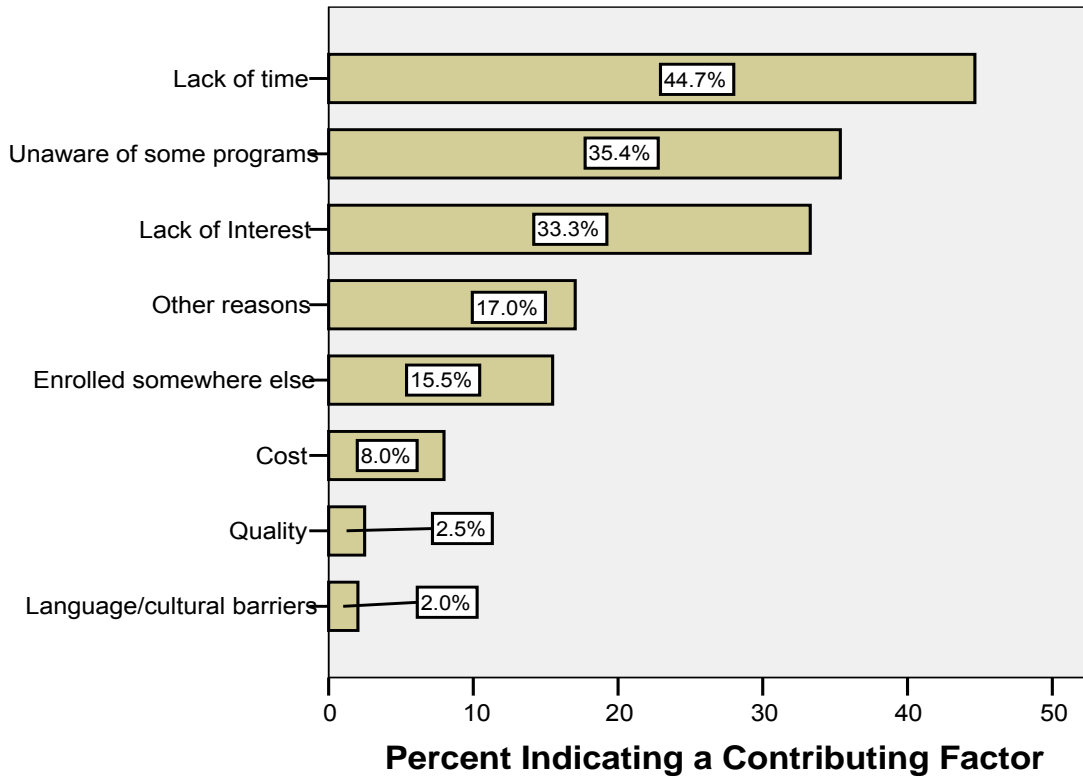
place of or in addition to DPD, a subject subsequently probed in greater depth. Age and health-related reasons were mentioned most commonly as “other reasons.”

Participation in Programs

Aside from visiting facilities, respondents were asked about their participation in DPD sponsored programs during 2006. Weighted sample results suggest that 25.8 percent of DeKalb District households participated in at least one organized program this past year. Among young adults (under 35), household participation was 26.5 percent. Families with growing children (ages 35 to 54), reported a significantly higher rate of participation (37.9 percent), while seniors (55 and older) reported only

8.7 percent program participation. Respondents in non-participating households were asked to shed light on what factors mitigated against program involvement. Weighted sample results are shown in Exhibit 4. Program quality and cost were found to be essentially insignificant.

Reasons For Not Participating in Organized Programs

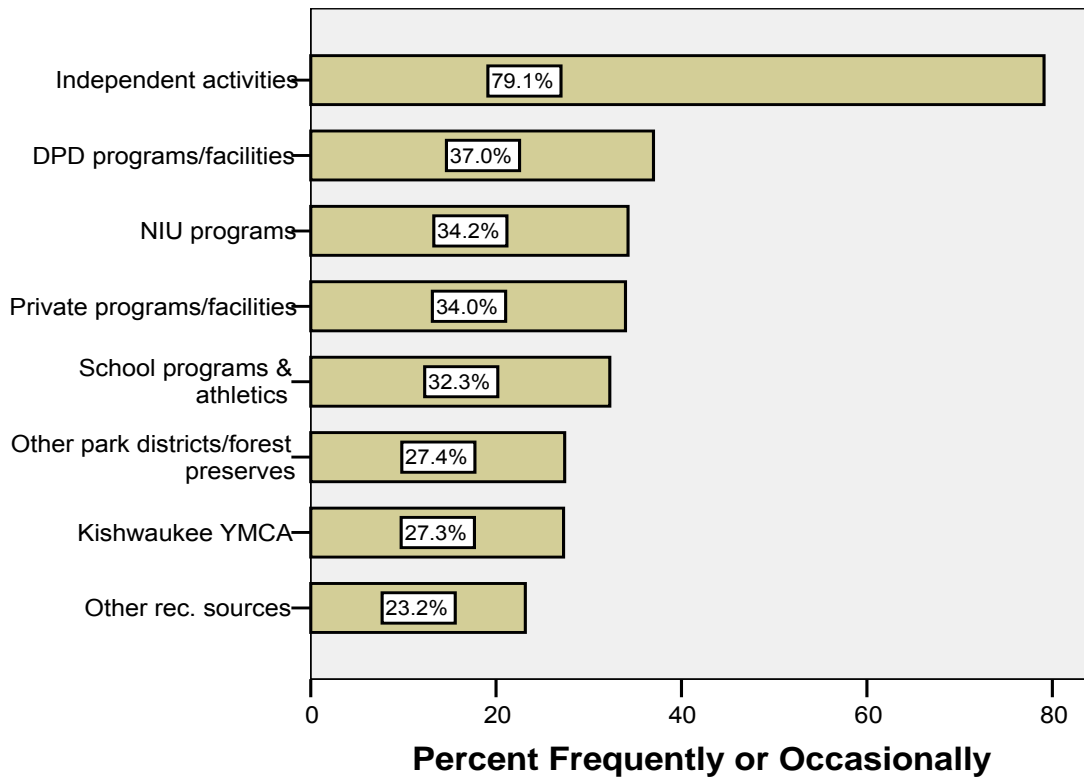


Once again, lack of awareness of program offerings was a common theme. Many, especially seniors, who indicated “other reasons” thought there was nothing age appropriate. Among those who did sign up for one or more DPD programs this past year, one-third first learned about them from the Program Guide. Many others indicated word first came from school. Among participants and non-participants combined, only about half expressed interest in on-line program registration in the future. Among residents under age 55, however, about 63 percent endorsed on-line registration.

Alternative Sources of Recreation

Realizing that DeKalb Park District is but one available option to provide for residents’ recreational needs, respondents were asked to indicate how often household members looked to various sources for fitness and recreation in 2006. As can be seen in Exhibit 5, by far the most common choice for recreation among

DeKalb residents is engaging in independent activities such as biking, jogging, and using home exercise equipment. DPD hosted activity was an option among 37 percent of households at least once a month (i.e., “occasionally”). Among the 35-to-54 age group (largely parents with children), about 50 percent indicated at least occasional use of school programs. It should be noted that the order of presentation of recreation choices to respondents was randomized.

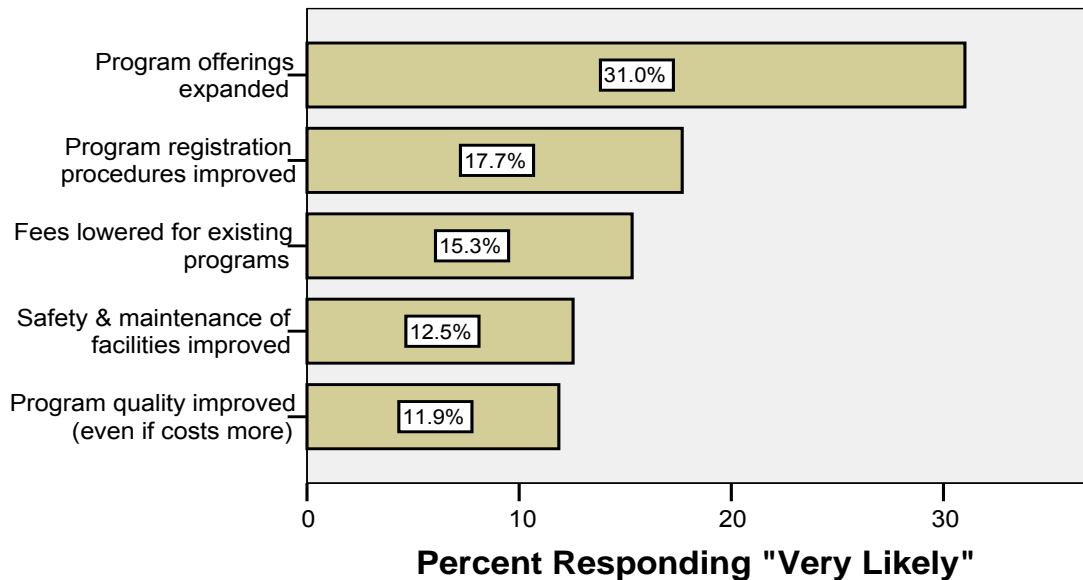
Future Planning and Potential Improvements

The next line of inquiry considered options for future planning. First, the instrumentality of five potential actions for increasing residents' use of the Park District was explored. As shown in Exhibit 6, expanding program offerings would

Would increase use if...

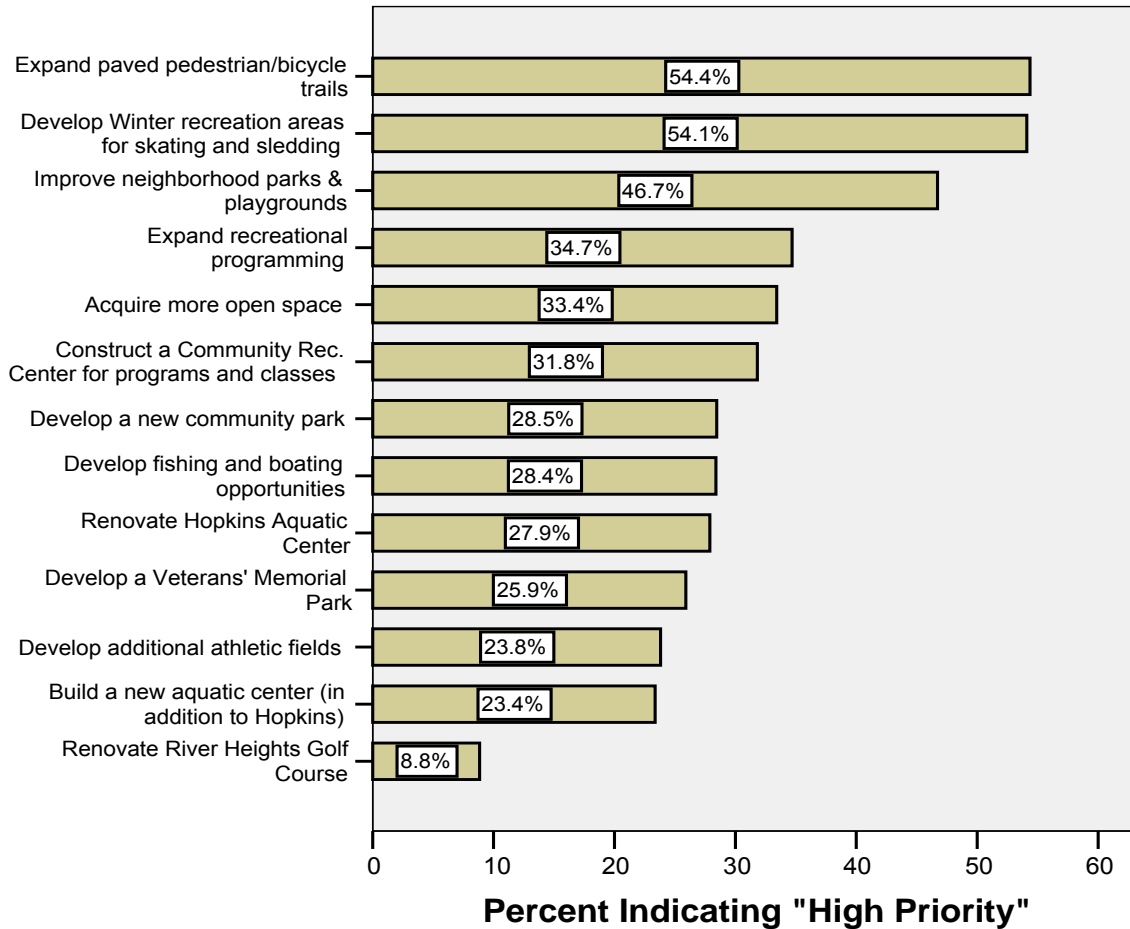


be very likely to increase Park District use among nearly one-third of DeKalb households. It could be argued that expanding knowledge of existing program offerings might have the same net effect for many residents.

Next, respondents were presented in random sequence with a list of 13 proposed improvements for future growth and expansion of services. Respondents were asked to indicate for each if the proposal should be given a high, medium, or low priority for growth over the next five to ten years. Those specifying "zero" or "no" priority were classified as "low" priority. Results for the overall weighted sample are shown in Exhibit 7. Three potential improvements were given a high priority by about half the community: (1) expanding paved pedestrian and/or bicycle trails, (2)

developing Winter recreation areas for skating and sledding, and (3) improving neighborhood parks and playgrounds. Keeping in mind this survey was conducted

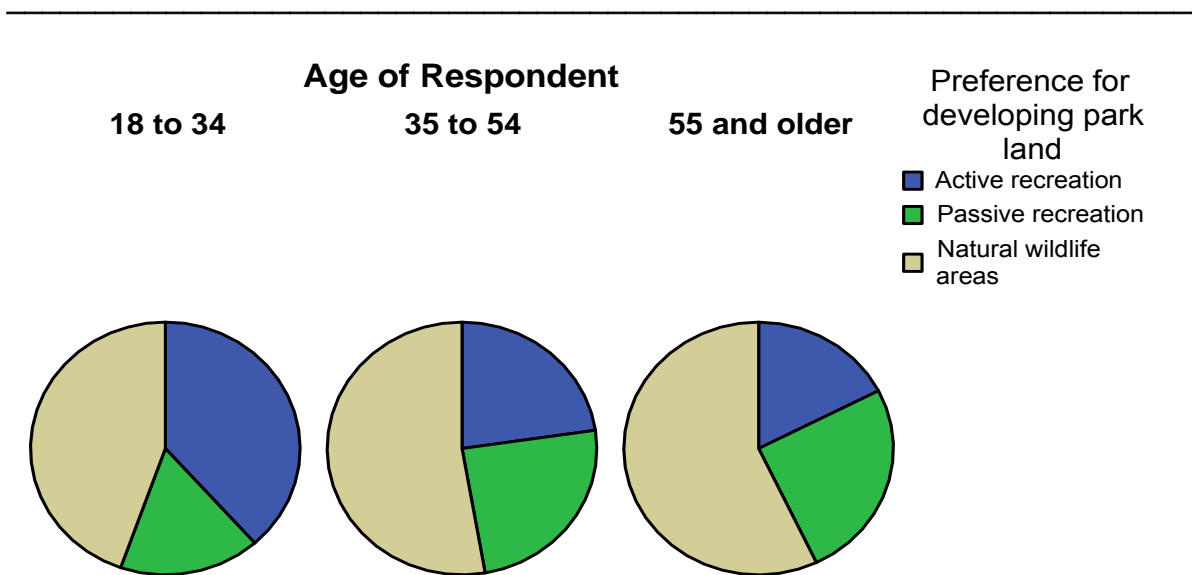
EXHIBIT 7

during Winter, seasonality may have biased responses to some extent. This includes potential inflation of skating and sledding areas, as well as de-emphasizing priority for fishing, boating, swimming, and golf. Interestingly, the three highest-priority improvements shown in Exhibit 7 comprised the top three for all age groups. Many specific suggestions for improvements were offered by respondents. These themes can be reviewed in verbatim commentary contained in Appendix C.

In terms of active vs. passive recreational land use, respondents were asked if the acquisition of additional park land should be primarily developed into active areas such as playgrounds and sports fields, or for more passive use such as picnic areas, benches and paths, or simply maintained as natural wildlife areas. Results for all age groups favored preservation of natural wildlife areas, but as can be seen in Exhibit 8, less so for those under 35. Proportionately more of these younger adults

Preference for Developing Park Land by Respondent Age

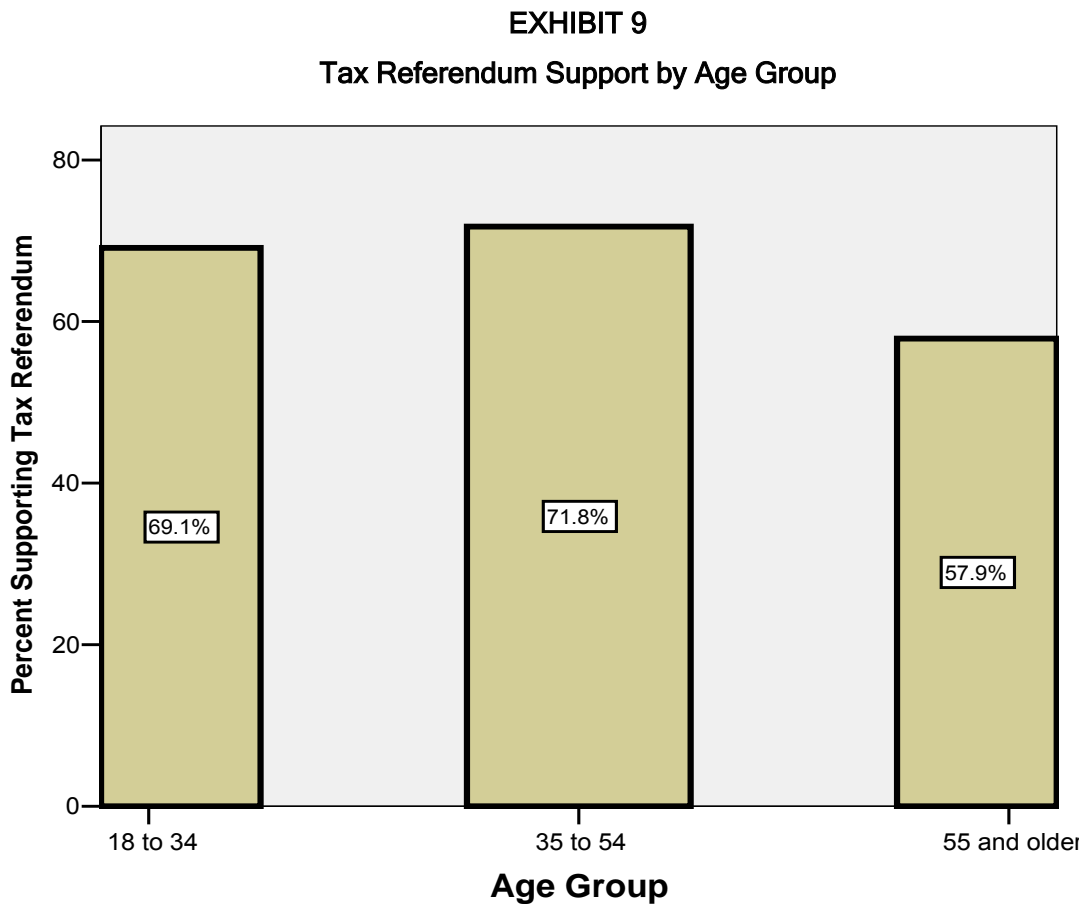


supported the development of newly acquired land into active recreational areas than did older age groups.

Concerning the financing of improvements over the next five to ten years, respondents were asked whether reliance should be placed primarily on tax

revenues, user fees, or both. A full 80 percent endorsed a balance of both taxes and user fees.

Finally, regarding tax support, opinion was sought concerning whether district residents should be asked to support a referendum to increase taxes. There was more support for increasing taxes to support capital improvements than to subsidize operating expenses, but the solid majority was found to support a tax referendum for funding in general. Support declined somewhat among residents over 55, as shown in Exhibit 9.



Overall Satisfaction

The final area of investigation concerned levels of overall satisfaction for aspects of DPD functioning, and also an opportunity for respondents to provide summary comments in their own words. Satisfaction was measured on a five-point scale from (1) “very dissatisfied” to (5) “very satisfied.” Results for the overall weighted sample

are shown in Exhibit 10. Again, this is the best estimate of all district residents. Mean satisfaction ratings by age group are shown in Exhibit 11. It can be seen that most residents are favorably disposed toward DPD, somewhat more so toward

Satisfaction With Aspects of DeKalb Park District

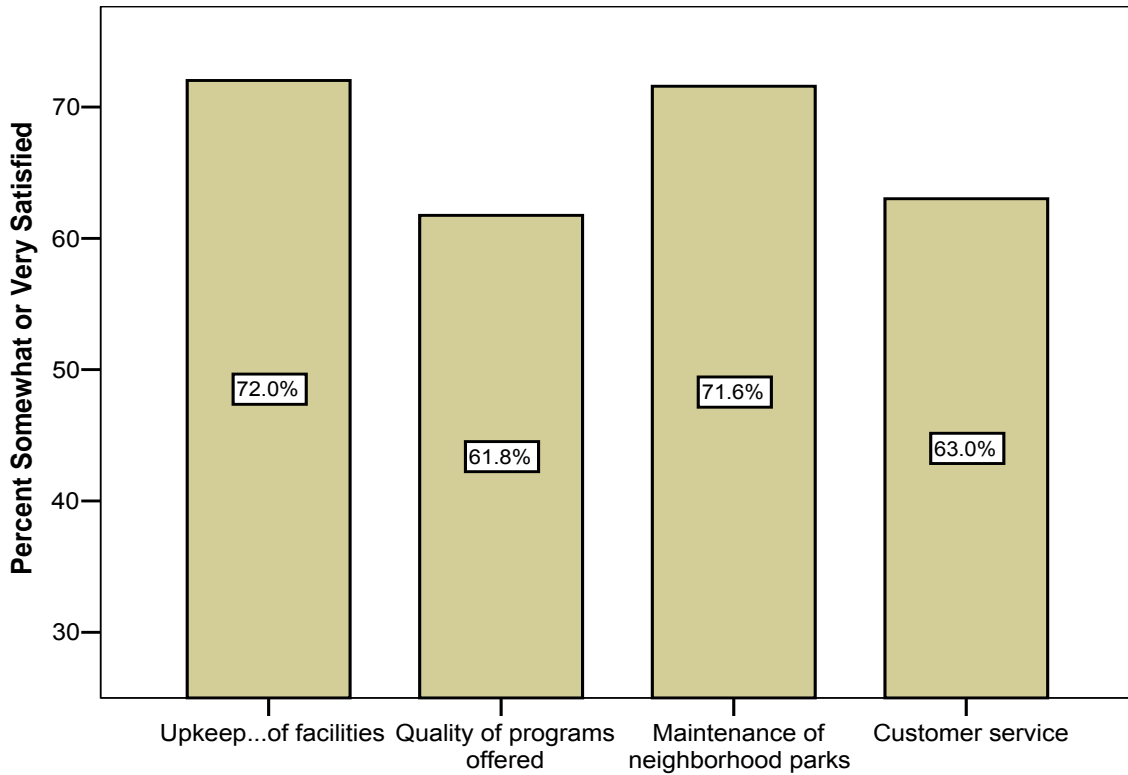

places and facilities than toward interaction with programs and people. Also, three out of the four aspects of DPD functioning had statistically significant differences among age groups. While seniors found fewer reasons to partake of DPD offerings, it can be seen that their levels of satisfaction typically were higher than younger respondents. Noted as well was the lower score younger adults gave to customer service.

Many respondents availed themselves of the opportunity to comment on what the DPD (1) does best, and (2) could do better. All commentary is listed verbatim in Appendix C. Many kudos were given for the wide variety of activities offered and the cleanliness of facilities. Examples include:

- *They maintain their parks in a high quality manner, they have a lot to be proud of in the park district. I'm proud of them even though i don't use them as much as I should.*
- *They offer a very nice balance of programs for a diversity of people living here.*
- *They provide facilities for a large range of people to recreate. I think they do a wonderful job with what they got.*

Many constructive suggestions were offered as well in response to the question, *In your own words, what could the Park district do better?* A few representative comments include:

- *They could clean up Hopkins pool area, offer a nice exercise center for adults and seniors, and offer a sledding/skating area. It would be nice if there were more community type classes offered like ceramics, art classes, etc.*
- *They could communicate to the neighborhood residents better. They could do newsletters or newspaper articles or flyers to households. Or they could post online minutes in a timelier manner.*
- *One of the reasons we don't use them much we don't know what they have to offer, as far as adult programs, getting the word about what they offer.*

Explanation of Terms Used in Presenting Data

Cases are referred to as either “valid” or “missing.” All respondents selecting a defined response category or range are “valid” cases as opposed to “missing” cases. “Missing” cases are either user defined or “system” defined. For this data set, the most common user-defined missing case designator was “not applicable,” assigned when respondent is unable to select among valid response categories. Missing cases designated “system” occur when respondents were never presented with the opportunity to respond because the item does not apply as defined by prior responses. Programming logic branches respondent around inapplicable pages. Here is an example. Respondents were asked, *How many children under the age of 18 live in your household?* Only those responding one or more are asked the follow-up question, *How many preschool children under the age of 5 live in your household?* All others are considered system-defined missing cases.

Summary tables for categorical items include a raw “frequency” count, and a “percent” of all cases equivalent. Two other columns display the “valid” percent and “cumulative” percent. “Valid percent” is simply the percent of all “valid” cases as defined above. “Valid percent” typically is the most useful comparative statistic. “Cumulative percent” is the sum of the valid percent for that category and those listed above it. “Cumulative percent” has meaning only to the extent item categories have an ordinal relationship, such as rating scales.

About the Public Opinion Laboratory

PUBLIC OPINION LABORATORY

The Public Opinion Laboratory (POL) is a full-service survey research facility, collecting information by means of telephone, on-line, mail, and face-to-face focus groups. Its primary objectives are:

1. By means of survey research, contribute to the knowledge and understanding of significant social, economic, business, and health issues in Illinois and nationally.
2. Provide outreach service to northern Illinois community development projects involving survey research.
3. Conduct survey research in accordance with professional standards of the American Association for Public Opinion Research and sponsor requirements.

Housed in NIU's Social Science Research Institute (now the Monat Bldg.), the POL is a nonacademic unit of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. A variety of social science disciplines have been represented by former and present professional staff, some of whom now serve as academic faculty; others are actively completing graduate degree programs at NIU.

Administration of the POL is the responsibility of the director with back-up support from the associate director. This includes budget management, staffing, business development, resource planning, responding to RFP's and writing formal grant proposals. As necessary, both director and associate director serve as well as study directors for specific research projects.

Other professional staff include full-time research associates who serve as study directors and researchers on ad hoc project teams, applying their expertise in social science research methods and substantive content areas such as organizational behavior, public health, and American government. The POL also utilizes the services of adjunct research associates from the campus community where they are a part of specific grants. Almost always, these associates have had prior affiliation on POL staff and are seasoned survey directors.

In addition to these research associates, a manager of telephone lab operations oversees all aspects of day-to-day administration of telephone surveys in accordance with project specifications. It is not unusual for 8 to 10 surveys to be active in the computer assisted telephone interview (CATI) lab at any one time. The POL's CATI lab recently expanded to a 45-station WINCATI facility, operating morning, afternoon, and evening hours seven days a week. To meet production requirements, the lab manager is responsible for hiring, training, and scheduling one hundred or more hourly, mostly part-time, interviewers and first-line supervisors, drawn primarily from the campus community.

The POL was created in the early 1980's in response to a request from the State of Illinois Department of Manpower Allocation for a telephone survey. Over the past 20 years, there has been a growing reliance throughout the United States on public opinion as input into program planning and public policy. The number

of sponsored projects has increased from 26 projects in FY2000 to over 40 per year. Projects can be classified into five broad areas of inquiry.

1. *Academic research.* This area continues to produce a steady source of contracts with researchers funded with grants. Interestingly, most of this activity comes from universities other than NIU, preferring the POL over more local survey research facilities. Some examples of current and recently completed studies include (a) collecting opinions of U.S. and Canadian residents about our purpose in meting out punishment to Iraq before and after the start of war [Cornell Univ.], (b) canvassing labor unions about their orientation to include minorities and other nontraditional segments of the workforce [Yale Univ.], (c) patterns of election behavior [SIU], (d) multiculturalism in the Chicagoland area [NIU], and (e) longitudinal follow-up of Chicago "Head Start" youth [U. of Wisconsin].

2. *Community planning.* This segment of business has been nurtured as part of POL's outreach efforts to the communities of northern Illinois. POL has now established itself as the center of choice for many communities in this high-growth region with needs to collect opinion information from their residents. Work has been done for school districts, parks and recreation facilities, public libraries, community colleges, and municipalities planning more generally to accommodate growth. Client sponsors just during the past two years include Aurora, DeKalb, Lake County, St. Charles, Sugar Grove, Yorkville, LaGrange, Vernon Hills, Deerfield, Geneva, North Aurora, Zion, and Algonquin as well as the City of Chicago. During this recent period, POL also has performed similar work for Midwestern communities as distant as the Quad Cities, Oakland, MI, and DeForest, WI.

3. *Public policy.* This area accounts for the largest source of external funding and greatest volume of surveying. Some projects are program evaluation activity where data collection occurs with specific listed samples, exemplified recently by POL's work with the Federal Department of Health and Human Services seeking to measure the effectiveness of their mediation process in child custody cases. Other projects are one-time needs assessments, such as surveying Chicago residents for the city's Public Health Department concerning their knowledge of and likely behavior in response to bio-terrorism attacks or other crises affecting public safety. POL also repeats surveys on an annual or biannual basis such as the aforementioned Illinois Policy Survey which gives the Illinois State legislature and other policy making bodies such as IBHE current information to establish annual funding priorities and program commitments. The State of Illinois sponsors several on-going POL projects. Surveys of registrants with the Department of Employment Security are conducted to evaluate training and other services provided. Most noteworthy is POL's continuing service to conduct the Centers for Disease Control's on-going Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) of Illinois residents, the results of which are folded into a prominent national data base. Eligibility to perform this work requires adherence to rigorous survey standards which are continually monitored and reviewed for compliance. In related work, POL

conducts county BRFs surveys coordinated by the Illinois Department of Public Health. At present, POL rotates surveying one-third of all Illinois counties each year. Finally, POL continues to support multi-year follow-up surveys of the Department of Children and Family Services foster care system and caseworker effectiveness.

4. *Business and organizations.* A growing segment of POL survey research is sponsored by private, public, and not-for-profit organizations. Typically, these are proprietary studies of organizational effectiveness or customer relations. Prominent here have been a series of inquiries for Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory (Fermilab) in Batavia. Both focus groups and on-line survey techniques have been employed to collect employee opinion concerning lab-wide communication issues. Additionally, for a trade organization, POL conducted a telephone survey of Illinois businesses concerning how they may be impacted by increasing manufacturing activity from China. In other not-for-profit work, POL conducted an on-line user survey of the Barrington Career Center, a grass-roots group helping northwest suburban Chicago residents through career transition. For private businesses, POL has conducted exit interviews with terminating employees, customer satisfaction surveys, 360-degree feedback reviews of management performance, employee satisfaction surveys, and of special note, an on-going series of program evaluation surveys for BP, an international Fortune 100 company. With its multi-national merging of company cultures, BP has keen interest in measuring progress toward achieving workforce diversity goals.

5. *Internal NIU projects.* As part of the NIU community, POL is responsive to survey research needs of the university. POL routinely conducts a survey of NIU alumni to track their career progress and opinions concerning their NIU educational experience. Over the past few years, POL has conducted user surveys of Founders Library and University Health Services, as well as program assessments of the Marketing Department and the CHANCE program. In addition, POL staff provides consultative expertise to others on campus engaged in survey data collection such as helping to set up an on-line method for secondary schools to report math and science priorities to the state Board of Education. Finally, POL's CATI lab facilities continue to be utilized for lab field work as part of sociology and political science course instruction in survey methods. Students in POLS 304 have used the lab to collect data on DeKalb county voters in two election campaigns that received media coverage.

Over 90 percent of clients over the past few years rate POL's services provided as good or excellent, and 86 percent considered using the POL again as "very likely." Although many survey research facilities can offer greater capacity to conduct larger-scale projects, POL has established a reputation for reliably servicing client needs and delivering an on-time, on-budget product. Having the technical competence and making itself available to the client are evaluated good or excellent 100 percent of the time. POL professionals are members of the American Association for Public Opinion Research.

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
